Emancipation Proclamation Commemoration

This coming year (2012), there will be a series of events leading up to the celebration of the 150th anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation on Jan. 1, 2013. The Norwich Area Clergy Association is participating in these.

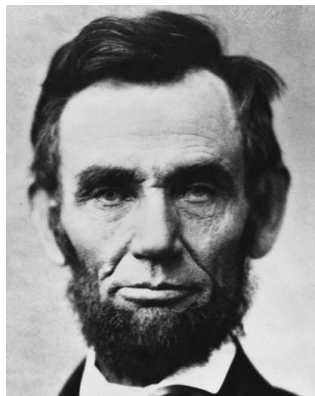
Here are some interesting facts:

- The Civil war cost about Americans about 620,000 military deaths.
- The number of civilian deaths is unknown.
- A conflict of similar scale in today's US would result in a death toll of 6 million or more.
- The civil war was unprecedented in its scale of destruction.
- Modern weaponry was used for the first time.
- Many, including Abraham Lincoln, reflected on how the war may have revealed divine will, as punishment for the sins of slavery.

In 1857, the U.S. Supreme Court declared that Africans in the U.S. had no rights that a white man had to respect. Africans in America, whether

free or enslaved, were no longer considered citizens of the U.S. State laws outlawing slavery were threatened by the decision. In Kansas, no-slavery and anti-slavery settlers had already been engaged in warfare. Many abolitionists, regardless of race despaired.

Few Connecticut residents were abolitionists. The majority believed in white supremacy and rejected voting rights for Africans residing in Connecticut. While many opposed the expansion of slavery into the new territories in the West, they also opposed immigration by those of African ancestry into the state or equal treatment of African American residents.



While many Norwich residents shared these sentiments, leaders like Governor Will Buckingham, Mayor James Lloyd Greene, and local clergy spoke out against slavery, and saw the war as an opportunity to end this evil. As a community, Norwich also sheltered a

number of fugitives from slavery, including shoemaker and Minister James L. Smith.

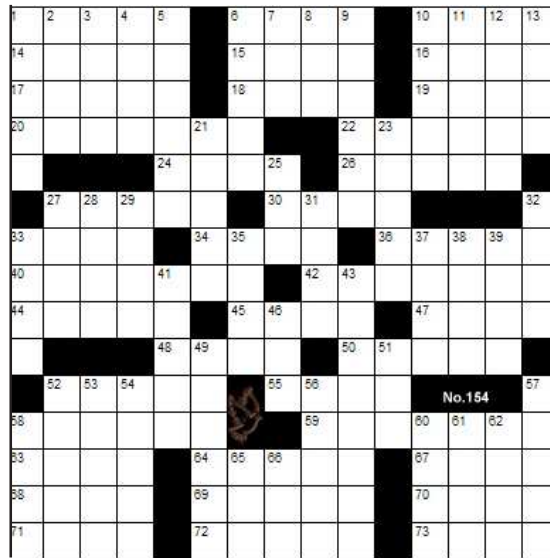
By 1862, with enormous casualties and expenditures of money, the American public was prepared to accept the drastic measure of emancipating the millions of Americans held as slaves as a war measure. Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation just as it was feasible to do so. It was, however, an act of considerable courage. Opponents of both the war and of emancipation gained political ground. Despite the pressure to revoke or modify the edict, Lincoln stood his ground. In 1864, he remarked to a visitor that he would be damned "in time and eternity" if he withdrew the measure.

The Civil War and its aftermath eliminated slavery from the United States, but what is its relevance today? Lincoln and many others, including African Americans, regarded the Declaration of Independence as the most important document of American history.

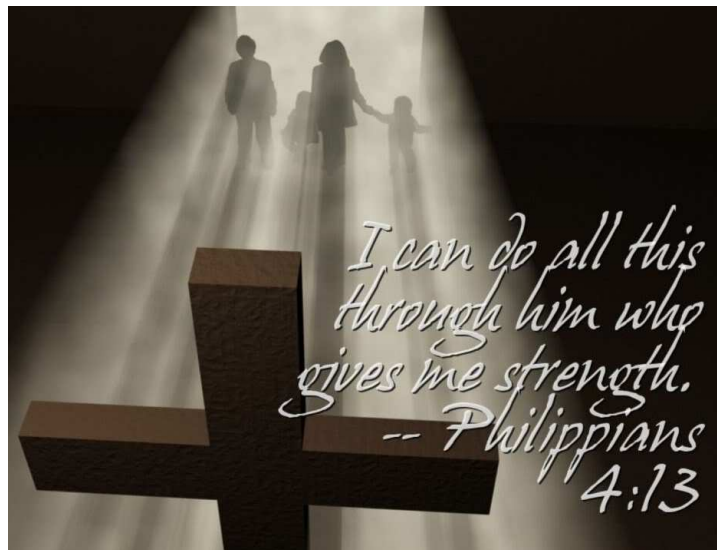

What sort of New Year's Resolution should a Christian make?

The practice of making New Year's resolutions goes back over 3,000 years to the ancient Babylonians. There is just something about the start of a new year that gives us the feeling of a fresh start and a new beginning. In reality, there is no difference between December 31 and January 1. Nothing mystical occurs at midnight on December 31. The Bible does not speak for or against the concept of New Year's resolutions. However, if a Christian determines to make a New Year's resolution, what kind of resolution should he or she make?

Common New Year's resolutions are commitments to quit smoking, to stop drinking, to manage money more wisely, and to spend more time with family. By far, the most common New Year's resolution is to lose weight, in conjunction with exercising more and eating more healthily. These are all good goals to set. However, 1 Timothy 4:8 instructs us to keep exercise in perspective: "For physical training is of some value, but godliness has value for all things, holding promise for both the present life and the life to come." The vast majority of New Year's resolutions, even among Christians, are in relation to physical things. This should not be.

Many Christians make New Year's resolutions to pray more, to read the Bible every day, and to attend church more regularly. These are fantastic goals. However, these New Year's resolutions fail just as often as the non-spiritual resolutions, because there is no power in a New Year's resolution. Resolving to start or stop doing a certain activity has no value unless you have the proper motivation for stopping or starting that activity. For example, why do you want to read the Bible every day? Is it to honor God and grow spiritually, or is it because you have just heard that it is a good thing to do? Why do you want to lose weight? Is it to honor God with your body, or is it for vanity, to honor yourself?



Philippians 4:13 tells us, "I can do everything through Him who gives me strength." John 15:5 declares, "I am the vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much

fruit; apart from me you can do nothing." If God is the center of your New Year's resolution, it has chance for success, depending on your commitment to it. If it is God's will for something to be fulfilled, He will enable you to fulfill it. If a resolution is not God honoring and/or is not in agreement in God's Word, we will not receive God's help in fulfilling the resolution.

So, what sort of New Year's resolution should a Christian make? Here are some suggestions:

- (1) pray to the Lord for wisdom (James 1:5) in regards to what resolutions, if any, He would have you make;
- (2) pray for wisdom as to how to fulfill the goals God gives you;
- (3) rely on God's strength to help you;
- (4) find an accountability partner who will help you and encourage you;
- (5) don't become discouraged with occasional failures; instead, allow them to motivate you further;
- (6) don't become proud or vain, but give God the glory. Psalm 37:5-6 says, "Commit your way to the LORD; trust in him and he will do this: He will make your righteousness shine like the dawn, the justice of your cause like the noonday sun."
